How to teach your child to read words with two syllables



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Reading 2 Syllable Words

Counting Syllables

A syllable is a beat of sound in a word. You can count how many syllables there are in a word by clapping each beat, or by putting your hand under your chin as you speak to count how many times it drops.

gift = 1 syllable christmas = 2 syllables holiday = 3 syllables

Breaking Rules

Breaking words into their syllables helps us read them. <u>Each syllable must have a vowel or vowel sound</u> - find these first. Then, follow the guidelines:

- Always break up double consonants.
- If there are two letters between the vowels, split them.
 But keep digraphs (two letters that make one sound) together.
- If there is one consonant between the vowels, try it on the right.

 If the word doesn't sound right, place the consonant on the left.

Open/Closed Vowels

Vowels make different sounds depending on where we break the word. A vowel is **open** when it's the last letter in its syllable, and **closed** when a consonant follows it in the same syllable.

Open vowels say their name: $p\underline{a}$ per $m\underline{o}$ tion

Closed vowels say their sound: $c\underline{a}m$ el $r\underline{u}n$ ner

Break the word! Learner underlines the vowels or vowel sounds, decides where to break the word and writes each syllable below. Learner ticks the correct boxes depending on whether the vowel says its name or sound. Learner reads each syllable separately and then blends the word together.

Build a reindeer! **Learner chooses one syllable from each column** to make a reindeer's name and **writes the name** on the dotted lines.

Story time! **Learner reads** the **story** twice, then the helper reads out the comprehension questions and **learner answers verbally**.

Sam was walking in the park when she saw a big pine tree dressed in bright lights and tinsel. A loud bell rang. Sam turned and spotted Rudolf! A little elf in red stepped out from behind him. "This is for you," the elf said, handing Sam a present tied with a neat red ribbon. Sam felt a rush of joy. What a sweet gift!

- 1. Where was Sam walking?
- 2. Who did Sam meet in the park?
- 3. How did Sam feel when the elf gave her the present?

■ Game time! Helper and learner take it in turns to read a word and mark it with either a 0 or X, whoever gets three in a row wins. Play three times.
